Thank you for agreeing to be interviewed as part of our study '**Parenting adolescents in Sub-Saharan Africa: Building a rigorous evidence base**'

The study is a collaboration between UNICEF's Office of Research and the University of Oxford. The researchers carrying out the qualitative research of which this interview forms a part are Heidi Loening-Voysey (Research and Evaluation Specialist (Child Protection) and Dr Jenny Doubt (Co-Investigator, University of Oxford).

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This study is a qualitative process evaluation of the Sinovuyo Teen parenting programme and its intended outcomes. It also considers the wider policy and socio-economic context in which the programme is taking place. Data collected in this study will be used towards a comprehensive evaluation and a set of relevant publications (academic peer reviewed as well as UNICEF working papers). The latter will speak to lessons learnt on the implementation of the programme as well as the receptivity of the programme. Direct quotations and contextual information will be verified with you.

We assure you that the information will remain anonymous. Code numbers will be used in all records and care will be taken to ensure that contextual information will not reveal your identity.

Ethical approval for this study has been provided by the Universities of Oxford and Cape Town.
